POLICY -VANDALISM POLICY

Each student is responsible for treating all infrastructure, areas of the institute premises and residential facilities as a home and keep them damage free. Vandalism is prohibited. Thus, each student is responsible for any damage resulting from acts of vandalism committed by them and/or a guest(s). Hostellers are expected to report acts of vandalism to the Director/Principal.

Vandalism is defined as any intentional behavior that causes destruction of institute property. Examples of vandalism include, but are not limited to, destruction of signs, tearing down bulletin boards, graffiti, damage to furniture, deliberate defacement of library materials, buildings, sidewalks, walls, trees or furnishings, and the deliberate setting of unapproved fires, even bonfires, within institute property, whether leased or owned.

Destruction, tampering, and theft of campus signs are considered acts of vandalism and are strictly prohibited. Campus signs include, but are not limited to hostels, parking, hall signs, and office signs as well as room numbering, traffic signs, and Greek or small housing signs. Sanctions for destruction, tampering, and theft of signs may include educational sanctions and sign replacement costs.

Additionally, acts of vandalism that target individuals or groups, or destroy, tamper with, and/or remove signs that provide an accommodation for members of the campus community will result in charges of discriminatory behavior.

Wherever possible, repair or replacement costs will be assigned to the individual(s) responsible for damage or destruction of institute property.

All vandalism is strictly prohibited and students or groups found responsible for vandalism will be subject to disciplinary and/ or legal action.





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Consequences/Penalties

Damage(s) to common areas will be charged to all residents of a particular block, floor or living area unless it can be determined who is specifically responsible for the damage(s). (on enquiry and subsequent admission and conclusion of the case)

The student may be subject to disciplinary consequences including possibility of restitution, suspension, expulsion, and exclusion from institute activities. Any damage to institute property/graffiti may result in legal consequences. Examples may include toilet papering, spray-painting,
